KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Dr. Brandon Gibb is a Professor of Psychology and Director of the Mood Disorders Institute at Binghamton University. Dr. Gibb completed his Ph.D. at Temple University in 2003 and has been at Binghamton University ever since. His research focuses on factors that contribute to the development and maintenance of depression across the lifespan. Integrating experimental and developmental psychopathology approaches, Dr.

Gibb and his colleagues seek to identify and integrate influences across several units of analysis including genetic, neural, physiological, behavioral, and environmental factors. Consistent with the NIMH RDoC initiative, his research also focuses on factors such as reward processing that, although relevant for depression, may be more homogeneous and/or cut across current diagnostic boundaries. His research has been funded by the National Institute of Mental Health and the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development for over 20 years.



Dr. Bruce Compas is the Patricia and Rodes Hart Professor of Psychology and Human Development and Director of Clinical Psychology Training at Vanderbilt University, USA. He received his bachelors degree in psychology and his PhD in clinical psychology from the University of California, Los Angeles.

His research is focused on understanding and improving the ways that children, adolescents,

and their parents cope with stress and adversity in their lives. Specifically, his work focuses on psychological, interpersonal, and biological processes related to coping and the regulation of emotions in response to acute and chronic stress. He is particularly interested in the translation of basic research into interventions to enhance resilience in

the face of stress His research involves both laboratory methods to study basic behavioral and biological processes, field research to understand coping and emotion regulation in the context of psychopathology (e.g., depression) and physical illness (e.g., Huntington's disease, cancer), and randomized clinical trials to test the efficacy of preventive interventions.



Abby Ciriegio, MS, M.Ed is a fourth year doctoral student in the Clinical Psychological Sciences program at Vanderbilt University under the mentorship of Dr. Bruce Compas. She received her bachelor's degree in Psychology from The Ohio State University and has subsequently completed a Master's of Education in Child Studies and a Master's of Science in Clinical Psychology from Vanderbilt University.

Broadly, Abby's research interests are focused on understanding the biological, behavioral, and psychosocial mechanisms that foster risk (e.g., executive dysfunction, psychiatric symptoms) and resiliency among children, adolescents and families facing health adversities. Abby has collaborated with Dr. Compas for over 5 years and has extensive experience with the implementation of basic science, as well as its translation into interventional contexts.



Dr. Heleen Riper is Full Professor of eMental-Health (Clinical Psychology) at the Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam and has a simultaneous appointment at the Amsterdam University Medical Centre Department of Psychiatry. She is also Honorary Professor of Telepsychiatry at the University of Southern Denmark and a visiting Professor at the University of Turku, Finland. In September 2022 she was awarded a Lifetime

award from the International Society for Research on Internet Interventions (ISRII 2022). Over the past 20 years her research focus

has been on the development, evaluation, and implementation of digital interventions for mental illness, especially those based on cognitive behavioral therapy. The scope of her current research activities includes the evaluation of mobile health and 'blended' treatments for depression and anxiety in specialized mental health care services. New methodological challenges include the development and evaluation of mobile ecological momentary assessments and interventions (EMA/EMI), patient-centred design and digital phenotyping. Since 2007 she has published over 375 (international) peer reviewed papers and book chapters within the digital mental health domain and in 2020 was ranked by the Web of Science™ in the top of 1% mostly cited researchers in the cross-sectional domain. She was a scientific advisor for the Innovation Foundation of Dutch Health Insurers (Innovatiefonds Zorgverzekeraars) from 2014 -2020. In 2013 she (co) founded the Journal of Internet Interventions

NHMRC Leadership Fellow at the University of
Sydney. Maree is Chair of Australia's Mental
Health Think Tank and Chair of the Million Minds
Mental Health Research Mission Expert Advisory

Panel. Maree is a Former National Mental Health Commissioner (2018-2021), an Australian Academy of Health and Medical Sciences Fellow, a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Social Sciences, and a Fellow of the Royal Society of New South Wales. Maree was awarded the Faculty of Medicine and Health's inaugural Distinguished Professor Award in 2023. Maree was announced as a Companion of the Order of Australia in the Australia Day 2018 Honours List, awarded a Westpac/Australian Financial Review 100 Women of Influence (Innovation), and awarded an

Australian Museum Eureka Prize for Outstanding Mentor of Young Researchers. Maree has made a major contribution to Australia's health and medical research effort in the field of mental health and substance use. In particular, she is known nationally and internationally for her research on the comorbidity between mental health and substance use disorders.


